Behavioral Ecology with its fourth meeting is visibly a very active area of research. How the character of our meetings should look like, whether access to presentations should be more regulated, and other problems related to this, needs to be discussed in the near future. However, as the Princeton meeting has shown again, it is the uncomplicated and relatively informal character of the ISBE meetings that stands out against other such conferences. At this point, we should all like to thank the organisers for their efforts and in particular that they have supported many participants from the developing countries. Goodbye Princeton, hello Nottingham!



TREASURER'S REPORT

Excerpt from the report presented at the business meeting of the society on August 20 in Princeton:

The society's accounts are currently kept in a savings account in Swiss Francs. The balance has increased from US-\$ 2,644.13 plus Can-\$ 320.45 at the meeting in Uppsala (August 1990) to SFr 8,672.70 (US-\$ 6,671.30) as of 30 June 1992. The society receives dues of \$2.50 for every member. This amounted to \$2,150 in 1991 and to \$2,045 in 1992. There were 579 regular plus 281 student members for 1991 (i.e. registered on Dec 30, 1990) and 593 regular, 225 student members for the 1992 dues. Production and mailing of the Newsletter costs ca. \$ 500-600 per issue. So far, the society has never had to pay for extra costs incurred by the secretary, or for any of the meetings held by the executive. With the reality of cuts in university budgets, the secretarial costs (e.g. postage etc.) will have to be covered by the society in the future. However, the general policy is to accumulate funds that eventually could be used for society goals, for example, to support students attending the meeting.

The U.S. Ethological Conference Committee is applying for a grant from NSF for partial support of travel for younger scientists to attend the XXIII IEC meeting. The costs of the conference will be relatively low compared to recent IEC meetings. If we are funded, the US Ethological Conference Committee (USECC) will use the funds to support younger U.S. scientists defined as those who received their Ph.D. degree between 1988 and 1992 or who will complete their Ph.D. during 1993. To apply for a travel award, please submit the following items to: Dr.Patricia Adair Gowaty, USECC Representative, Dept. of Zoology, University of Georgia, Athens, Georgia 30602, to be received no sooner than 1 January 1993 and no later than 15 January 1993: (a) seven (7) copies of a 1-2 page curriculum vitae, (b) 7 copies of the abstract you will be submitting for consideration to the IEC program and (c) 7 copies of two letters of recommendation sent separately by the recommendors. For those who have not completed their Ph.D. it is desirable that the major professor include an assurance that the degree will be completed during 1993. Deadline for applications: 15 January 1993. We hope to notify all applicants by 1 April 1993. Volunteers. Approximately 20 volunteer positions are open in 1993 at the American Museum of Natural History's Southwestern Research Station in Portal, Arizona. The volunteer program is run annually and offers students in biological sciences outstanding opportunities to observe and become involved with scientists doing field research. Food and lodging are provided to volunteers in exchange for twenty-four hours per week of routine chores, with the remaining time available for research activities.

The program is open to both undergraduate and graduate students; the latter may pursue their own research projects. Faculty knowing of promising students should alert them to this opportunity for professional experience toward, development of, and evaluation of their career goals.

Volunteers are needed between March 15 and November 1. Appointments are for part of this period, with a minimum appointment of six weeks. Applicants for spring positions (March-May) should submit applications by February 15, summer volunteers (June-August) by April, and fall volunteers (September-November) may apply any time.

* Interdisciplinary Training Opportunities in Animal Behavior, UC Davis. Opportunities are available for postdoctoral training, graduate training and undergraduate summer fellowships through the Research Training Group in Animal Behavior, supported by the Directorate of Biological Sciences of the National Science Foundation.

The aim of this program is to provide broadly interdisciplinary training for outstanding students to address problems in the study of animal behavior. The Research Training Group comprises 22 faculty participants from the fields of animal

physiology, animal sciences, avian sciences, biological anthropology, environmental studies, psychology, veterinary medicine, wildlife and fisheries biology and zoology. A second explicit aim of the program is to increase representation of underrepresented groups in the behavioral and biological sciences. Selection will be based on academic accomplishment and promise of ability to benefit maximally from interdisciplinary training.

Postdoctoral training: 2-year appointment, starting stipend \$ 18,600 plus medical benefits. Deadline: December 15, 1992 (or until filled).

Graduate training: 4 years of support, annual 9-month stipend of \$ 9,324 plus payment of tuition and educational fees for enrolment in a graduate program. Applicants must apply separately to an appropriate graduate program at UC Davis. Deadline: January 15, 1993.

Undergraduate summer fellowships: 2-month research interships, \$750 stipend plus room, board and roundtrip transportation to Davis. Deadline: February 15, 1993.
